JOINING GOD'S MISSION THROUGH HIS LOCAL CHURCH:

As Awakening is committed to awaken this generation to new life in Christ, we are grateful for your desire to partner with us in this unique purpose.

In Acts 2:41–47 we see how the early church banded together as a Christ-centered community from the very beginning. They gathered regularly to serve and spread Jesus' message of hope. They grew in grace, maturity, and number. Everything they had they shared in common. Overall, they were fully committed to Jesus and the local body of believers that they identified with as their church home.

For over a decade, Awakening has responded to God's calling to redeem people and restore this world through the power of Jesus. We have continuously challenged one another to live out the values and ministry evidenced in the early church. When we surrender our lives to Christ, He immediately brings us into God's family. When we choose to join together as a local church, we declare our commitment to Christ as active participants in His mission through this local and distinct community of believers.

A part of our commitment to this local body of believers is to seek to cultivate a pathway of growth where we COME to know Jesus, GROW as a disciple of Jesus, SERVE in the name of Jesus, and SHARE the love of Jesus. As we collectively engage in these steps of formation, the hope is that we grow in five key areas that are a "Profile of a Disciple" found within scripture:

- 1. Compelling FAITH: Prepared to share The Gospel with others.
- 2. Life-Giving PRACTICES: Consistent engagement in prayer and scripture.
- 3. Intentional RELATIONSHIPS: Active involvement in community and groups.
- 4. Extravagant GENEROSITY: Sacrificial giving for the cause of Christ.
- 5. Meaningful MINISTRY: Regular use of one's spiritual gifts.

WEEK 1: COMPELLING FAITH

God's biblical mandate for ALL believers

As Jesus was sent into the world to make the invisible God known, he has now entrusted and commissioned his followers to advance this same mission, famously described in *Matthew 28:18-20*:

18 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

To be agents of this mission means we are to be people who have a compelling faith. A faith that is compelling to the outside world, and a faith and compels us to tell others about the love of Jesus.

Read *Matthew 5:13-16*. How do you see our local church illustrating this hoped outcome of being salt and light into the world?

Recognizing our personal networks

Intentional pursuit of others

We want to be a people that intentionally and graciously pursue the not-yet-Christian in our lives with authenticity and love. To help cultivate this kind of purposeful living, we seek to live out these three phases of our evangelistic efforts towards others: Prayer, Care, and Share.

PRAYER: Regularly praying for those in our networks who aren't currently followers of Jesus.

CARE: To look for meaningful and genuine opportunities to care for our neighbors, co-workers, and classmates with an act of service, an invitation to a meal, or gift of encouragement.

SHARE: To look for opportunities to take a risk and either share an invitation to church or share about the love of Jesus, allowing the Spirit to lead whichever conversation is needed.

How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation, who say to Zion, "Your God reigns!"

WEEK 2: LIFE-GIVING PRACTICES

Progressing as a Christian

GOD DESIGNED ALL LIVING THINGS to grow—and He wants us to partner with Him in the growing process. We plant, water, and fertilize, and God makes trees bud, and crops flourish. We parent, and He guides our children into adulthood. We coach or teach, and He enables students and athletes to become more skillful.

That growth partnership is true in the spiritual world, too. God designed each of us to mature into fully devoted followers of Christ. When we trust Him to do His part, which He always does, and faithfully do our part, we can count on the spiritual growth He will bring.

But there's a tension. Although God is faithful in His part to help us grow (the supernatural work of the Holy Spirit), we consistently fall short on our part. We resist things that would help us grow, fail to trust the Spirit's help, and sometimes do things that actively keep us from growing. This tension will be with us all our lives. But when we commit to the growth process through our partnership with Him, we can deepen our lifelong response to His grace and earnestly express His grace to others. That's what spiritual growth is all about.

The Inward Signs of Growth

The Purpose of Spiritual Practices

The tools we use to grow spiritually (such as Bible reading, prayer, silence, solitude, enjoying the beauty of creation, and worship) are often referred to as "spiritual practices." Religiously, self-righteous leaders of Jesus' day thought engaging in these practices would impress God— even if their hearts weren't right (*Mark 7:3–4*). It didn't (*Matthew 23:13– 36*). The purpose of spiritual practices is to help us experience God's grace—not earn His favor.

Conclusion

WEEK 3: INTENTIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

Relationships that optimize life change

THOSE WHO ATTEND AWAKENING gain the opportunity to get to know God at deeper levels and to see one another as we truly are: children of the Most High God who are loved completely and forgiven freely. Every event, experience, and relationship helps us understand those things more fully.

For example, when gifted teachers teach from God's Word, it changes how we think because we get a glimpse into the goodness and holiness of God. When we gather for corporate worship, we celebrate and enjoy a dimension of God's beauty that inspires us. When we meet in small groups, another group member can remind us of what we sometimes forget: God loves us beyond measure, is working in us, and will carry us to heaven one day to be with Him. These are moments that remind us we are breaking free from sin and becoming more like Him.

Conclusion

A Christ follower honors God's call to participate in community in order to grow in Christlikeness, to express and receive love, and to carry out the ministry of the church.

For this reason, Christ followers give priority to attending the corporate gatherings of the church for the purpose of worship, teaching, and participation in the sacrament of Communion, and are connected relationally to a small group of believers for the purpose of mutual encouragement, support, and accountability.

Christ followers also:

- 1. Pursue Christ-honoring relationships at home, within the church, and in the marketplace, and are committed to pursuing the biblical pattern of reconciliation when conflict arises.
- 2. Support and pray for the leadership of the church.
- 3. Affirm and uphold the fundamental truths of Scripture.





WEEK 4: EXTRAVAGANT GENEROSITY

The Reasonable Response to Our Gracious God

"Mine." It's one of the first words we learn as children. In one sense, knowing the difference between "mine" and "yours" is a natural and necessary phase of childhood development. It helps us become self- aware and establish appropriate boundaries.

The downside is that "mine" can quickly morph into an attitude of selfishness. There's no area where that shows up faster than in our attitudes about money. So, it shouldn't surprise us that Jesus and New Testament writers talk a lot about the concept of money and possessions. They know our tendency is to forget that "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it" (*Psalm 24:1*).

Despite our tendencies, God is still incredibly gracious. Even though He knows we will mismanage what He has given us—and it's all His— He still shares it with us. All He asks is that we be gracious and sacrificial with it.

That's what Jesus did. He gave up everything in heaven to graciously and sacrificially accomplish our redemption. When we follow His lead, He promises we will store up for ourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy and where thieves do not break in or steal (*Matthew 6:20*). When we get there, no one will grasp for more or try to selfishly clutch their "toys." No one will ever say "mine" again. We'll freely enjoy what our good stewardship here has imitated—it's all His, and He freely gives it to us (*Romans 8:32*).

A Giving Benchmark

In the Old Testament, believers were required to give a tenth of their income to the support of the ministry and the needs of the poor (*Genesis 14:18–20, Leviticus 27:30–32, Proverbs 3:9–10, Malachi 3:8–10, Exodus 23:16, 19*).

Today, 10% isn't a mandate, but a suggested benchmark realizing for some, 10% is too low of a starting point, while just 5% may be a significant sacrifice.

How We Should Give

- GENEROUSLY: We know Christ has given us everything and owns all we have.
- **PROPORTIONALLY**: We give the highest percentage of our income possible, recognizing the tithe (10 percent) as a historic benchmark to consider.
- **REGULARLY**: As resources flow in, we offer our "firstfruits" back to God (*Proverbs 3*:9), honoring Him first—before fulfilling our other financial obligations.
- LOCALLY: Awakening is our spiritual home, and we support it with our giving because God uses the church to bless us, those in our community, and our brothers and sisters around the world.
- **COMPASSIONATELY**: As God directs (*James 1:5*), we give beyond our normal levels of giving to support special initiatives for those in need.
- CHEERFULLY: Knowing God sees our heart, we don't give begrudgingly. We give as a willful, joyful act of worship to honor God and serve others.
- HUMBLY: We don't call attention to ourselves when we give—and we don't give to gain favor or influence over others.
- **EXPECTANTLY**: We're confident in God's provision and look forward to how He will use our gifts. We know He is pleased when we give generously and sacrificially. We look forward to seeing how He will faithfully provide for our physical needs when we have been faithful in honoring Him with the firstfruits of our income.

Commitments for Extravagant Generosity

- 1. I believe all I have has come my way through the loving hand of God.
- 2. I will live joyfully within God's current provision for my life (*Philippians* 4:12–13).
- 3. I will honor God by giving the first portion of my earnings to him (*Proverbs 3:9–10*).
- 4. I will save a portion of my earnings for emergencies, above-and-beyond giving, and future opportunities (*Proverbs* 6:6–8).
- 5. I will live each day with an open ear toward God and respond eagerly to any direction He gives me regarding my resources.





Conclusion

Christ followers realize they were bought with the price of Christ's blood, and everything they are and have belongs to Him. In light of this, they desire to be responsible caretakers of the material resources God has entrusted to them. In response to Christ's abundant giving, his followers increase their resources to His lordship and display a spirit of extravagant generosity and cheerfulness in supporting the work of the church.





WEEK 5: MEANINGFUL MINISTRY

God-Given Abilities Used for the Common Good

IF GOD GAVE EVERYONE IN A CHURCH every spiritual gift, what would that look like?

"What a tremendous ministry!" you may think. "No shortage of volunteers. If the pastor is sick one week, no problem! Everyone has the gift of teaching, so anyone can fill in. Every small group has a leader; every ministry vacancy has a number of potential directors to choose from. In addition, there are no financial problems because everyone has the gift of giving and gives way beyond the tithe!"

Maybe. But think a little harder. There would be constant frustration because no one could fully use their gifts—and developing them through practice would be almost nonexistent. More importantly, we wouldn't need or appreciate each other.

God's plan for the church looks better than this. He gave everyone different gifts and abilities for ministry ministry, so we'd excel at different things and therefore need each other.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

THE BIBLE: We believe the Bible to be the fully inspired and living Word of God, without error in their original manuscripts and is completely trustworthy in every way and authoritative for all of life. (*2 Tim. 3:16-17; 1 Pet. 1:22-23; Heb. 4:12-13*)

GOD: We believe in one living and true God, the Creator of all things visible and invisible, who is personal, infinite, and perfect. Who exist in perfect unity as three equally and fully divine Persons: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. (*Duet. 6:4; 2 Cor. 13:14; Matt. 28-19-20*)

HUMANITY: We believe that every single person has intrinsic value as they have been made in the image of God and are ultimately designed to enjoy a life-giving relationship with the God of the universe. (*Gen. 1:27*) Yet as a result of mankind's rebellion (*Gen. 3; Rom. 3:23*) each person has experienced the aftermath of the fall (a sinful nature, suffering, & separation from God) and in and of themselves has no way of restoring a right relationship with God. (*Rom. 5:6-8*)

JESUS: We believe that Jesus is the eternal Son of God, who was moved by love in accordance with the will of the Father, took on human flesh (*Jn. 1:1, 14, 18; Lk. 1:3*). Jesus, being fully man & fully God, lived a sinless life and sacrificially died on the cross in our place, bringing salvation to all who would place their faith in Him (*Rom. 3:22-24; 2 Cor. 5:21*). He rose again visibly and bodily from the dead 3 days later and appeared to over 500 eyewitnesses. (*1 Cor. 15:1-8; Rom. 4:25*) Jesus ascended into heaven and now sits at the right hand of the Father; the Head of His body the Church (*Col. 1:15-20*), the only Savior and Mediator between God and man (*Heb. 7:25; Rom. 8:35*), and He will one day return to earth in power and glory to restore all things. (*1 Thess. 4:13-18; 2 Thess. 1:7-9*)





SALVATION: We believe that salvation (the restoration of relationship with God both now and for eternity) is found in Jesus Christ alone (*Jn. 14:6; Acts 4:12*). Salvation is offered to each and every person by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, who died on the cross for the payment of our sin and rose again from the dead on the third day defeating sin, death & Satan (*Eph. 2:8-9; 1 Cor. 15:3-8*). We believe that salvation is a work of God and that no one or no thing can undo what God has done. (*Rom. 8:38-39; Jn. 10:27-30*)

HOLY SPIRIT: We believe the Holy Spirit is the 3rd person of the triune God. We believe the Holy Spirit is sent to indwell the believer baptizing him/her into new life (Eph. 1:13-14; Jn. 3; 1 Cor. 12:13), sealing them for salvation [Eph. 1:13-14; 4:30] and sanctifying them becoming more like Christ [Jn. 16:8-11; Rom. 8:1-17]. We believe that there is evidence of the Spirit's active work in one's life namely the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22; Jn. 15)



CHURCH: We believe the Church is God's supernaturally empowered community that has experienced the radical grace of God & expresses His love to a broken and hurting world. We believe that Jesus is the head of the Church & that He has supernaturally gifted every believer to belong and to build-up His Church in unity: "being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit & purpose." (*Eph. 4; 1 Cor. 12; Matt. 28:18-20; Eph. 1:22-23; Phil. 2:2:1-5*)

MISSION: We believe that every follower of Christ is called to be a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ (*1 Pet 2:6-10; Matt. 28:18-20 2 Cor. 5:14:21*). Leaders are to equip God's people to fulfill their God-given purpose on this planet (*Eph. 4:11-13*) in a way that cooperates with their unique gifting, within the context of teams and that is fueled by love. (*Rom. 12:3-13*)

SPIRITUAL GIFTS: We believe that Jesus is the giver of spiritual gifts as a sign of his victory over sin, death & Satan for the building up of His Church. (*Eph.* 4:7-13). We believe that all the gifts are at work and in operation today in His church and the expression of these gifts within the context of the worship service should be done in an orderly manner under the authority of the Leadership Council of Awakening Church. (*I Cor.* 14)





BAPTISM & COMMUNION: We believe that Jesus left 2 ordinances for the church that are both memorial and mysterious in nature: Baptism and Communion. Baptism is the public identification of the believer in the Body of Christ and is representative of the Holy Spirit's work in the heart of the believer; identifying with Christ in His death, burial & resurrection through submersion into water (*Matt. 28:18-20*). Communion (the Lord's Supper) is the active remembrance of the community of believers of Christ death until He returns and should be practiced with reverence and self-examination (*1 Cor. 11:23-26*)

THINGS TO COME: We believe in and expectantly wait for the glorious return of the Lord Jesus Christ. When He returns He will restore all things and reign victorious (*1 Cor. 15:51-57; 1 Thess. 4:13-18*). We believe that all people will experience a bodily resurrection and stand before the judgment seat of Christ. Those who have placed their faith in Jesus will be ushered into the very presence of God experiencing eternal life (heaven). Those who have rejected the offer of salvation will experience eternal separation from God (hell). (*Lk 16:19-26; Rev. 20:11-15; Heb. 9:26a-28*)

LOVE: Jesus was very clear about what mattered most to Him. He said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35, See also 1 Corinthians 1). The Bible doesn't say that we'll be known for our beliefs, or what we say. The Bible declares that we – as disciples of Jesus Christ – will be known by our love. Love matters most because to God, people matter most.
